We offer opportunities for people to take part in creative activities, gain new skills or develop their artistic talents.









THE DIFFERENCE WE MAKE

Society changes the way it sees people with learning disabilities, there is greater understanding of what people with learning disabilities can do and what they offer everyone.








WHAT IS LIFE **REALLY LIKE IN** 2018/19?

Realities of life for people with learning disabilities in the UK:

- Around 1.4 million people in the UK have a learning disability [1]
- Females with a learning disability have a life expectancy of 18 years lower than the general population. Males life expectancy is around 14 years lower than the general population. [2]
- · At least half the learning disabled population experience loneliness and isolation [3]
- Less than 7% of people with learning disabilities are in paid work [4]



Life in Lewisham:


- Around 5,400 adults in Lewisham, where we are based, have a learning disability. [5]
- People with mild or moderate learning disabilities have been hit particularly hard by benefit and budget cuts, with benefits removed from all except those with the most critical needs (12%). This can result in financial hardship and stress for people with learning disabilities. [5]
- · Lewisham has the highest amount of children with Autistic Spectrum Disorders known to schools across England - 22 pupils per 1,000. This trend is increasing faster than anywhere else in the country. [6]
- In the last eight years, youth services in London have been cut by 34%. Vulnerable young people have far fewer places to go. [7]

OUR IMPACT - KEY STATS

- Our artists gave **75** performances reaching **15,874** people
- **3,509** people participated in our activities
- Our young people's activities reached 5,642 people
- We reached **122,969** users and followers on our websites and online social media networks
- We supported 24 artists with learning disabilities who had opportunities to develop their skills, creative independence and audience reach

















ART:

Our artists performed in more new spaces than ever before reaching out to new audiences, having national and international impact.

WHAT WE DID:

- We supported 24 artists with learning disabilities who had opportunities to develop their skills, creative independence and audience reach
- Our artists gave **75** performances across the UK and internationally reaching **15,874** people
- We collaborated with 14 artists and organisations to create new and exciting pieces of art including Wellcome Collection, London Symphony Orchestra (LSO) and Tate Modern.





Our artists performed in an increasingly diverse range of venues including:

The Fish Police toured Indonesia and took part in the Archipelago Festival and Sofar Sounds at the invitation of the British Council.

Robyn Steward started a new music residency at Cafe OTO, creating an inclusive space for audiences to listen to experimental music.

Chris Collins continued working with artist Will Dickie on the performance piece 'The Rave Space' with a run of shows at Camden People's Theatre

Sam Castell-Ward launched his latest EP 'Living in the Real False World' at local Deptford venue Buster Mantis.

The Beautiful Octopus Club returned to Southbank Centre where over 3,000 people enjoyed performances from Heart n Soul artists, collaborations with the London Symphony Orchestra, live radio and the Heart n Soul DJs.

Plus our innovative SoundLab digital music project increased opportunities for our artists, participants and audiences to create music and sound experiences. Our largest public event 'SoundLab Play Rave' held at the Wellcome Collection attracted audiences of over 400 people.

HEART N SOUL AT THE HUB

In October 2018 Heart n Soul became the new research residents of The Hub at Wellcome Collection. Heart n Soul at The Hub is a research project led by people with learning disabilities and autistic people. Over two years, our work is exploring the value of difference and questioning what is `normal'.



The project is based in The Hub at Wellcome Collection, a space where lots of different people with different skills come together to do research.

We work in a collaborative way with disabled, learning disabled, autistic and non-disabled artists and researchers, cultural writers, social scientists, computer scientists and designers.

Through our research we want to challenge society's attitudes towards people with learning disabilities and autistic people. We will be finding out how relationships between people who appear different from each other can affect mutual wellbeing.

This is the first time the award has been given to an arts organisation in The Hub's history. We spent the first six months introducing Wellcome to Heart n Soul through our Chat Ups, live radio and SoundLab. We also invited collaborators to share their thoughts around the questions 'what is a productive person?', 'what is normal?' and 'what is the value of difference?'










HEART N SOUL AT THE HUB: OUR APPROACH



IMMERSION

Immersion is our new project which offers the opportunity for organisations to join Heart n Soul in an exploration of what organisations look and feel like when they look at people with learning disabilities in a different way. The project looks at what great art looks like with this running through its centre; and what difference it can offer to all of us.

This year we worked with Battersea Arts Centre (BAC), Tate Modern and the Wellcome Collection.

Immersion was launched with the Battersea Arts Centre (BAC) co-producing The Rebels Season at Allsorts. It finished with an Allsorts showcase in the BAC cafe and Lizzie Emeh and Electric Fire performing at the Rest and Resistance Ball. 150 people attended.

TAKING PART

There were more ways for people with learning disabilities to take part in our creative programmes and connect with others.

- 148 people took part at Allsorts, our creative taking part programme for adults with learning disabilities
- 72 young people took part at Do Your Own Thing, our creative arts project for young people with learning disabilities aged 10-25
- **35** people **co-produced** events
- 61 volunteers took part at Heart n Soul

ADULTS

Our Deptford Club Nights developed in exciting new ways. Taking place around venues in Deptford, they have provided a friendly environment for people with and without learning disabilities to experience art together in the local community. We held 5 club nights in 2018/19 attracting a total of **560** people.

The Heart n Soul Choir also developed in exciting new ways. They started to sing more complex songs with different vocal arrangements. They also performed in a range of venues from performances at The Beautiful Octopus Club to busking at London Bridge tube station raising over £600 for Heart n Soul.

YOUNG PEOPLE

Our young people's programme of work grew in the range of opportunities open to them and the quality of their work.

7 artists took part in the Never Bored summer arts residency in collaboration with creative agency Could be Good. They created original pieces of artwork and showed them at an exhibition in Deptford.

There were also more collaborations with a number of organisations including Tate Modern. Our young artists were involved in a range of different workshops and events there throughout the year. This included Testing, Testing, Testing, an inclusive arts day which featured live radio and performances by our Do Your Own Thing participants.

Do Your Own Thing, our creative arts project for young people with learning disabilities took over Southbank Centre's Imagine Festival. The event was called 'The Squidz, the Jellyfish and Me' inspired by ideas from participant Reuben. It gave us an opportunity to showcase everything we do at Do Your Own Thing. **28** young people were involved and **3,000** people attended on the day.

RADIO

Radio became part of Heart n Soul's core activity and was included in many of our projects and activities across the year. It's given our participants new ways to express themselves and an opportunity for Heart n Soul to connect with new audiences.

We created 49 shows including regular live shows at Allsorts and Do Your Own Thing involving **221** people.

Radio also reached out to new spaces, with live shows at Wellcome Collection, Southbank Centre and Tate Modern. Most significantly, radio has enabled participants to increase their presenting and production skills and we've seen a big rise in confidence.





ABI O'NEILL VOLUNTEERING AT HEART N SOUL

I've been volunteering with Heart n Soul for three and a half years now and it's been a brilliant experience. One of my early highlights was The Beautiful Octopus Club back in 2016. It was the first big event I was part of, it was amazing and I wanted to tell everybody about it, it was a joy to be part of.

I mainly volunteer at Allsorts, but have also volunteered at Do Your Own Thing and Squidz Club. From the start I was really taken aback by the quality of the work that was being made, I hadn't really seen that before in many other places that I'd volunteered, it felt like a cool place to be.



Seeing how much participants have developed has been very special. I also feel that volunteering has changed me a lot too. I feel more confident in being able to make a room work well, and make sure everyone is safe and having a good time. I've also tried things that I've never done before, like printmaking and painting.

I think the most important thing about being a volunteer is being there as that friend or support that can help somebody get the most out of the session. The relationship and time you have with the participant is the most important thing.



At Allsorts I've also had the chance to run a workshop. I did a Morris Street Dance session which was a strange call, but is something that I'd done in my cabaret work for many years before joining Heart n Soul. Everyone absolutely loved the session and left smiling. It was nice to share what I did outside of Heart n Soul and introduce something new.

There are so many things I love about being a Heart n Soul volunteer. The friendships that I've made are lovely and are such a special thing. Being here allows people to explore and think about things differently and you start to do that yourself.





Danielle: We make art first.


Rosie: Yeah, we do some drawings, we get all our ideas down and they're usually based around something that has happened to Danielle recently or something she's inspired by.

How does creating your art and music make you feel?


Danielle: Happy. I feel very excited, because I'm good at doing them. I think they're perfect.

That's really had an impact on my way of working. We've taught each other things and that's important when you have a good collaboration.


How has Heart n Soul supported the development of your relationship?

Rosie: We've been working on a new song 'Not My Problem' inspired by everything in Danielle's new pink bag. Danielle is going to make a music video for the track.


Danielle: I'm looking forward to that.

Rosie: And an album is coming!














FOUR

I also got chosen to be part of Ravioli Me Away's opera 'The View From Behind the Futuristic Rose Trellis'. The story is about different segments and different stories about things that are happening in another world.

I play a character called Fresh Eyes. He watches the world and he sees everything that is happening. I also came up with the words for a song called 'Chalice of Sugar'. It's about doing stuff your own way, making music the way you want to make it, so people will get happy when they listen to it.

The first place we performed it was at the Wysing Arts Centre in Cambridge. I didn't have any nerves. We've had a really good response and I'd like to do more. So what's next? I'd like to perform with Heart n Soul artist K-Dog and I'm currently working on two albums.

It's a big opportunity being part of Heart n Soul and I've enjoyed it. It's changed me, I've been learning things from other people and it's made me more confident in myself and when speaking to other people. I'd say if someone wants to have a career in the creative arts have fun and be yourself.
